

## Study ranks region's most dangerous intersections

NEW BEDFORD — Paren Padel finished pumping gas into a dark-colored sedan and assessed the midday queues of traffic at the lights where Routes 6 and 140 meet, a spot that has been determined to be the third most dangerous intersection in Southeastern Massachusetts.

"It's a busy road and people drive fast," said Padel, standing outside One Stop Gas Variety, a gas station and convenience store located at the intersection.

According to a report released this week by the Southeastern Regional Planning & Economic Development District, that intersection saw 85 crashes between 2006 and 2008.

The group studied crashes in 27 communities in that twoyear span, ranging from Attleboro to Fall River to Middleboro to Wareham to Taunton. The most dangerous intersections are located in Fall River and Swansea, followed by the Route 6 spot.

"The problem at that intersection is congestion," said Jim Hadfield, SRPEDD's transportation planning manager. "There is extensive gridlock out there."

SRPEDD's list, culled from state data, features 100 trouble spots, including 13 intersections in New Bedford, five in Dartmouth, and other spots in Lakeville, Freetown, Wareham and Westport.

The severity of the crashes is factored into each location's ranking, Hadfield said.

Mike Russell, owner of Century 21 Hughes & Carey, which is located a block from


